Description of application:

Notability is a comprehensive note taking and organization app that allows students to take notes in a variety of ways. On a single page of notes, students can type, write, draw, highlight, record audio, cut, paste, and even insert content captured from websites other apps or emails. When they're finished, students can organize notes for easy access later. A major asset of this app is the ability to annotate on PDF documents, combined with the zoom window you can quickly and clearly draw details on a document. Notes are backed up to the cloud and can be synced with several different services, Dropbox, Google Drive, Box or WebDAV. Exporting notes is easy too, notes can be saved as a pdf, rtf or as a note and sent by email, exported to Dropbox, Google Drive, Box or WebDAV and even opened in another app. You can also import content from Dropbox, Google Drive, Box or WebDAV. The ability to add audio recordings, and insert content makes note taking and self expression easy for everyone. This app allows students to take notes the way that makes the most sense to them.

Incorporation explanation:

Note taking occurs in every classroom in one way or another. Now, there's a way to give students the freedom to take notes the way they're most comfortable and help them stay organized. The flexible nature of Notability allows students to interpret ideas using various modalities. In an English class that has 1:1 iPads this app can be used to create reading and

writing notebooks. These notebooks would contain the students work as they read and write thorougout the school year as students comptelete assignments they can be shared using Google Drive or emailed to the teacher. Student work could include audio recordings and drawings as well as handwritten or typed notes or essays.

Teachers can also share documents with students through Dropbox, Google Drive, Box or WebDAV and students can then have access to teacher created content.

There is no limit to the ways this app can be incorporated into the classroom to help students create and organize their work.
