## Description:

This app provides a series of exercises and games for ELA (or math, but I haven't tried it). Topics include reading, writing and composition, grammar, vocabulary booster, and communication. The sub-skills in each category are exactly what I am teaching in the classroom, so this app caught my attention. The questions have a link to a mini-lesson to teach a skill. Short, but challenging, literary passages are linked followed by questions. There is a practice mode and a timed test mode. Scores can be saved and badges earned. Students can compare scores to others and see progress. The reading passages and questions are very "Common Core" and thus are good test prep.

Classroom application: In the classroom, students can use this as an independent practice. For guided instruction, in small groups, a teacher can go through the skills with students to monitor progress.

This app is certainly great for individual use for students to reinforce skills being taught. You could assign a particular lesson which students can use to review skills.

The free version has a few lessons in each category and the paid (about \$5) version has more questions. I'm not sure how a student's scores are saved, but I think it's possible.
